The Flight Path Block combines flying geese and pieced units to create a structured yet dynamic design. The crisp, intersecting shapes evoke the feeling of movement and direction, like geese in formation cutting across the sky.

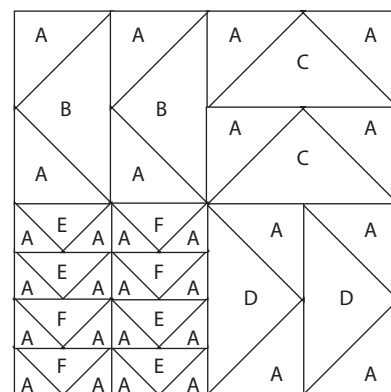

## Cutting Instructions

Qty	9" finished block 12A	9" finished block 12B
12	2 3/4" squares (A)	2 3/4" squares (G)
8	2 1/4" squares (A)	2 1/4" squares (G)
2	5" x 2 3/4" rectangles (B)	5" x 2 3/4" rectangles (H)
2	5" x 2 3/4" rectangles (C)	5" x 2 3/4" rectangles (I)
2	5" x 2 3/4" rectangles (D)	5" x 2 3/4" rectangles (J)
1	3 3/4" square (E)	3 3/4" square (K)
1	3 3/4" square (F)	3 3/4" square (L)

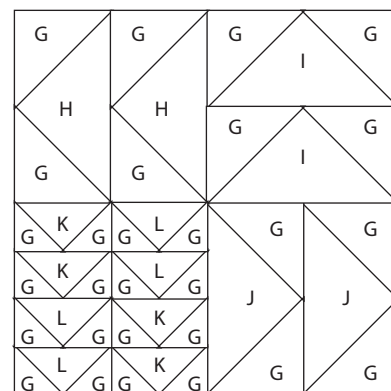

Depending on your planned layout, Fabric A and G may be the same 'Background' fabric.



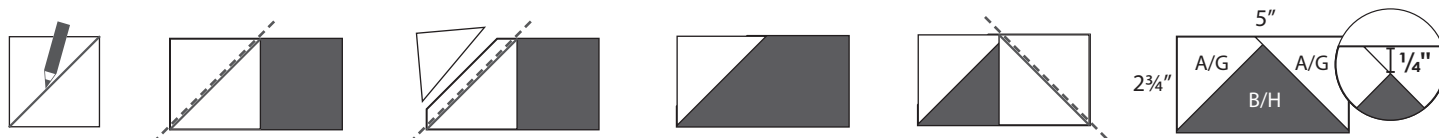


## Piecing Instructions

### Step 1

On the wrong side of each  $2\frac{3}{4}$ " A/G square, draw a line from one corner to the opposing corner as shown.

Align an A/G square on one end of a B/H rectangle, right sides together as shown. Stitch on the drawn line, or just a thread's width outside of it, and trim the seam to  $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Press the seam to the A/G triangle or open.

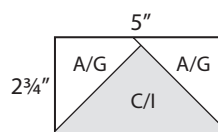


(1) B/H rectangle + (2) A/G squares  
= 1 A/G-B/H flying geese

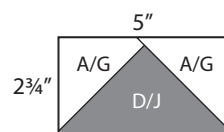
Make (2).

Align the other A/G square on the other end of the B/H rectangle, right sides together as shown. Stitch on the drawn line, or just a thread's width to the outside of it, and trim the seam to  $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Press seam to the A/G triangle or open.

Repeat to make (2) A/G-B/H, (2) A/G-C/I, and (2) A/G-D/J flying geese. Trim units to  $5" \times 2\frac{3}{4}"$ .

### Step 2

On the wrong side of each  $2\frac{1}{4}$ " A/G square, draw a line from one corner to the opposing corner as shown.

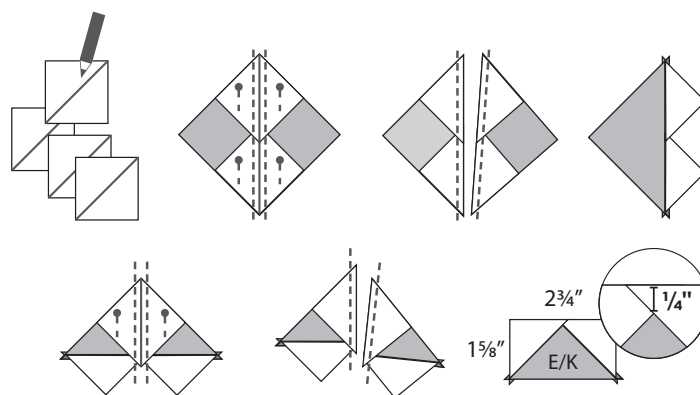
With right sides together, align (2) A/G squares in opposite corners of the E/K square as shown.

Stitch a scant  $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam on both sides of the drawn line. Cut the square apart on the line to yield (2) partial flying geese units, and press the seams to the A/G triangles or open.

With right sides together, align another A/G square in the corner of the E/K triangle as shown.

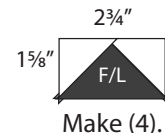
Stitch a scant  $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam on both sides of the drawn line. Cut the square apart on the line to yield (2) complete flying geese units, and press the seams to the A/G triangles or open.

Repeat to make (4) A/G-E/K and (4) A/G-F/L flying geese units. Trim to  $2\frac{3}{4}" \times 1\frac{5}{8}"$ .



(4) A/G squares + (1) E/K square  
= (4) A/G-E/K flying geese

**TIP:** To trim these small flying geese, mark your ruler with a fine-tip Sharpie where the V lines up. When you're done, remove with rubbing alcohol.





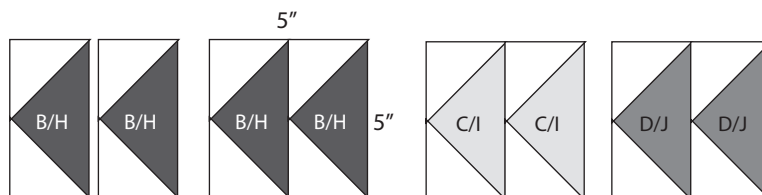
## Piecing Instructions, continued

### Step 3

Lay out both A/G-B/H flying geese as shown.  
Join to form the large flying geese unit.

Trim unit to 5".

Repeat to make C/I and D/J large flying geese units.

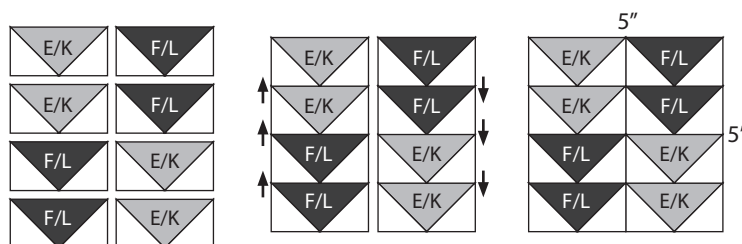


### Step 4

Lay out A/G-E/K and A/G-F/L flying geese as shown.  
Join into two strips, and press seams in opposite  
directions as shown.

Join strips to form the small flying geese unit, and  
press seam open.

Trim unit to 5".

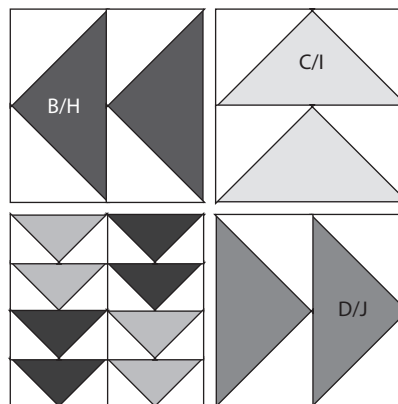


### Step 5

Lay out flying geese units as shown.

Join units to make the full block.

Trim both blocks to 9½".
